Year	Date	Information
1883	July 24, 1883	W.S Johnson, a school teacher, school superintendent, college professor, invented the world's first electric room thermostat because his classrooms were always too cold or too warm. He was co-founder of Johnson Controls and helped run the "Johnson electrical services Co. for 26 years. He was awarded 50 patents.
1894	Sept 10, 1894	First Meeting of the American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers in New York City; 75 members
1904	Dec 4, 1904	First Meeting of the American Society of Refrigerating Engineers in New York City; 74 charter members
1914		ASRE has 4 chapters - NY, Chicago, Milwaukee, St Louis
1921		F.Paul Anderson was Director of the ASHVE lab from 1921 to 1925. In 1927 he became President of the Society.
1922		The first American Heating and Ventilating Engineers " Guide " was published by the Society's Research Bureau. This eventually led to the Handbook Series. 10 years later ASRE produced their first "Data Book"
1922	###	An organizational meeting was held in Toronto with the many Canadian members of ASHVE to discuss the formation of a Canadian chapter.
1922	Tue May 09, 1922	The first Canadian ASHVE chapter - the Ontario Chapter in Toronto Ontario chartered under ASHVE. The Chapter in 1982 changed its name to the Toronto Chapter [016] and is in Region 2. Mr. M.F.Thomas was the first President with H.H.Angus President the following year 1923-24
1922		By resolution of the council of ASHVE, Benjamin Franklin was designed the Patron Saint of ASHVE
1928		Thomas Midgley invented CFC - chlorofluorohydrocarbons to provide a refrigerant safer than ammonia, sulphur dioxide and other toxic gases. Until 1928, those who could afford a home frig had to keep them outside. By 1935, 8 million frigs using R12 were sold. by 1960 more than 300,000 tons of CRCs were produced each year. Midgley's 2nd most famous invention was leaded gas to reduce the horrible knocking in kerosene engines.
1929	June 26 to 28, 1929	The first Canadian location of the Society's Semi-Annual Meeting of the Society - ASHVE held outside of the United States. It was held at the Bigwin Inn on the Lake-of-Bays in the Muskoka area of Ontario which is north of Toronto. The meeting was chaired by Society President Lewis. All the 350 attendees had to travel by train - the Canadian National Railway in a special train to Huntsville ON. From Huntsville, the attendees boarded a lake steamer to a portage and from there they took a narrow gauge railway to the Lake-of Bays where they took another boat to the Bigwin Inn dock. This famous summer resort is still operating in 2010. It was the best attended session in the 35 year history of the Society. Mr. M.Barry Watson of the Ontario Chapter was General Chairman.
1932		Willis Carrier was the first recipient of the new F.Paul Anderson Award an ASHVE award in recognition of work done and meritorious services performed in the field of HVAC.
1935	###	The second Canadian ASHVE chapter chartered as the Manitoba Chapter is located in Winnipeg Manitoba. The meetings were held at the Hotel Fort Gary. It is now part of Region XI. 10 members signed the chapter petition. The Chapter Bell was presented to the Manitoba Chapter by Harold F. Randall on Dec. 1, 1956 and is still used to preside over chapter dinner meetings. The 30's and 40's saw rapid changes in industry with one pipe steam systems; gravity flow hot water; cast iron air furnaces; coal stokes; circulation pumps and automatic temperature controls.
1936	Thu April 02, 1936	In Montreal, there were some 10 ASHVE associated with firms in NY. Two members in particular, G.Lorne Wiggs a consulting engineer and Clare Johnson, Mgr of Cdn Sirocco drew up a petition for a chapter which was dated April 2, 1936 and signed by 10 the ASHVE members.
1936	Mon May 11, 1936	ASHVE council approved the third ASHVE Chapter in Canada - a new Montreal Chapter which held their charter night May 11, 1936. The Chapter Charter was signed by G.L. Larson, Society President and attested by Society Secretary A.V. Hutchinson. Some 74 members and guests attended the charter night. Chapter continues to be called the Montreal Chapter[014] and is now in Region 2 - eastern Canada.
1935	June 16 to 19, 1935	The second Society Semi-annual meeting held on Canadian soil was in Toronto Ontario
1936		Membership in ASHVE and ASRE now exceeds 5000
1938		First Canadian Society President E.Holt Gurney form Toronto 1882-1954
1944		ASHVE purchased a building in Cleveland for their own research laboratory. It was in operation till 1961.
1946	June 10 to 13, 1946	The Third Society outside of the US on Canadian soil was held in Montreal Quebec.
1949	Fri January 28, 1949	Meeting held in Ottawa to encourage membership in ASHVE. 7 members and 18 guests were present. A goal of 20 members was suggested to request the chartering of a chapter.
1952	Wednesday, April 09, 1952	The fourth Canadian chapter in ASHVE - the British Columbia Chapter of ASHVE was chartered on April 9 th 1952, with the inaugural meeting and formation of the BC Chapter of the American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers (ASHVE). Society President Ernest Szekeley presented the Charter, at the Quadra Club in Vancouver. There were 36 Charter Members, headed by our first Chapter President Eth Minaker.
1950	June 19 to 21, 1950	The Fourth Society Semi-Annual Meeting held outside of the US was held in Canada at Gravenhurst ON, a resort town north of Toronto. The Ontario [Toronto] chapter hosted the event.
1950	June 5 to 9, 1950	The First ASRE meeting was held outside of the USA and held on a St.Lawrence/Saguenay cruise

1952	Sept 16, 1952	The fifth Canadian ASHVE chapter - the Ottawa Valley chapter , had its Charter night Sept 16th, 1952 at the Prescott Hotel in Ottawa ON. The Ottawa Valley Chapter charter was presented to Mr. B. Stotesbury by Mr. Ernest Szekeley, the national president of ASHVE and by Mr. John Fox from Toronto who represented ASHVE Grand Council. Mr. W. Hole the representative from the Montreal Chapter presented the Ottawa Valley Chapter with an ebony gavel with an engraved plate having the following inscription "presented to the Ottawa Valley Chapter on the occasion of their charter meeting, by the Montreal Chapter A.S.H. & V.E., September 16th, 1952". In 1956, the chapter formed part of Region 7. Ottawa Valley[015] is currently in Region 2 - eastern Canada
1952		Society name change ASHVE became ASHAE. Of note there were 1000 members who were members of both ASHAE and ASRE in 1954
1955	Wednesday, June 22, 1955	First official meeting of the new Montreal Section of ASRE. It was assigned to Section IV - Montreal, Toronto, Buffalo, and Syracuse. Hay Murray was now a charter member of both ASRE and ASHVE - a Canadian first. In 1972, he organized ARC - ASHRAE Research Canada, a corporation for soliciting research investments in Canada.
1956	Thursday, March 15, 1956	The sixth Canadian chapter in ASHVE/ASHAE was the Northern Alberta chapter chartered under ASHAE located in Edmonton Alberta - now part of Region 10
1956	Mon April 09, 1956	First Annual CRC for 6 chapters the new Region 7 was held April 9th, 1956 in Toronto at the Engineers Club with John Fox as DRC. The amalgamation of ASRE and ASHAE was discussed. Six chapters were in Region 7 -Toronto, BC, Manitoba, Montreal, N.Alberta, Ottawa Valley. Quebec was chartered 9 months later. Life member was explained - member had to be dues paying for 30 years and age 65. The First V-P of ASHVE P.E. Gordon explained the philosophy of the plan for regional operation of the chapters in Society. Note - Delegates travel was paid to CRC but not the Alternate. A chapters operating guide was discussed. Possible future chapters were suggested as Quebec City, Windsor, London and Calgary. Hay Murray of Montreal asked the attendees to consider merging the ASHAE and ASRE groups. Most delegates supported the concept. Mr. Hutchinson referred to a plan developed in the 1930's on the same topic.
1956	###	The seventh Canadian chapter now chartered under the ASHAE banner was the La Ville de Quebec Chapter chartered after the Society's BOD approved application Oct 12th, 1956. John Fox was DRC for Region 7. 65 chapters in total were part of ASHAE. John James President of the Society presented the charter.
1956	###	Second ASHAE CRC for Region 7's 7 Canadian Chapters held in Ottawa at the Chateau Laurier. 7 chapters present. Delegates from British Columbia, Manitoba, Montreal, N. Alberta, Ontario, Ottawa Valley and Québec. Society President P.B.Gordon was present as well. D.J. McIntyre was elected recording Secretary. Chair of the meeting was W.G.Hole [DRC]. Hay Murray moved, Jake Klassen seconded that amalgamation be actively pursued at the chapter level.
1957	June 22 to 27, 1957	The Fifth Society Meeting [now ASHAE] held outside of USA was near Montreal at Murray Bay[now called La Malbaie] Quebec. L.B.Gordon Society President presided over the meeting. The meeting lasted 5 days with 3 days of technical presentations. HQ was the Hotel Manoir Richelieu. The Montreal chapter was host.
1957	Saturday, October 12, 1957	The eighth Canadian chapter chartered under the ASHAE banner in Canada was the Southern Alberta chapter, located in Calgary Alberta
1957	Mon April 28, 1958	Third Annual CRC for Region 7 held in Winnipeg with Delegates and Alternates from all 7 Canadian chapters - BC, Manitoba, Montreal, N.Alberta, Ontario, Ottawa Valley, Québec. Topic was to reorganize Canadian chapters with US chapters -was rejected because of economic ties across Canada and not north/south. S.Alberta Chapter in Calgary chartered later that year. National President Prof. E.R. Queer outlined the proposal for the merger of ASHAE and ASRE. Vote will take place in December 1958. The summer convention of the Association will be held in Vancouver as planned. The 1959 Regional meeting was selected for Montreal.
1958	Sept 12 to 13, 1958	Montreal Section of ASRE hosted the Annual Meeting of Region IV ASRE. Chapters included Syracuse, Buffalo, Toronto, and Montreal. A regional meeting for the aforementioned chapters was held Sept 16th, 1958 in Rochester NY.
1958	###	ASHRAE was born in 1959 as a result of the amalgamation of ASHAE and ASRE. It took some 3 years of discussion and a 2/3 vote of the respective membership to approve the merger.
1959	Mon April 20, 1959	First Region 2 CRC was held in the Peribonac Room in the Queen Elizabeth Hotel in Montreal Quebec Monday April 20th, 1959. Arthur deBreyne President of the Montreal Chapter of ASHAE and Gordon Cox Secretary of the Montreal Chapter of ASRE welcomed the Delegates. W.G.Hole of the Montreal Chapter was the Region 2 DRC; Chapters were la Ville de Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa Valley, Manitoba, Ontario, N. Alberta, S. Alberta and British Columbia - 8 in total. This was noted as First CRC in Region 2. At some point, the British Columbia Chapter was reassigned to Region 10 which included all the ASHRAE chapters on the west coast of USA that were in ASHRAE. This resulted in 7 chapters in Region 2. Delegates were W.F.Wiggins of BC; R.A.Williams of N.Alberta; L.D.Ontonio S.Alberta; A.K.Percy Manitoba; R.A.Ritchie Ontario -now Toronto; A.H.Hargreaves Ottawa; Art deBreyne Montreal; P.J.Lamarche Quebec. Society officials: Society President Cecil Boling; D.D.wile 2nd V-P; Walter A. Grant 3rd V-P; John Fox; R.C.Cross HQ Technical Secretary.
1959	###	The ninth Canadian chapter and the 88th chapter overall in ASHRAE was the Niagara Peninsula chapter. It was chartered in October 1959 , the first chapter chartered after the amalgamation. The Ontario chapter submitted the petition to form a chapter at the ASHRAE Annual General Meeting in June 1959. The chapter name was changed to Hamilton Chapter in 1971. Lloyd Algie was the first chapter president.
1960	spring	The Second Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Edmonton with 8 chapters - BC chapter had moved to Region 10. Chapters present were from Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa Valley, Ontario[Toronto] Niagara Peninsula [Hamilton], Manitoba, S.Alberta, N.Alberta.
1960		ASHRAE moved into the United Engineering center in New York City in 1961. There were 40 full time staff with Robert C. Cross as Executive Secretary. In this same year, the ASHRAE guide and the ASRE Data Book were combined into the Handbook series and published in 3 volumes -Equipment, Systems and Applications. Andy T. Boggs succeeded Cross in 1967.
1960	June 13 to 15, 1960	The Sixth Society meeting held outside the USA was held June 13 to 15, 1960 in Vancouver BC. Dan D. Wile was Society President. <u>This meeting was actually the 67th Annual General Meeting of the Society and was held at the Hotel Vancouver.</u> By this time ASHVE (which had dropped the Ventilation moniker to ASHAE) had merged with the American Society of Refrigerating Engineers (ASRE) to become ASHRAE, as we know it to this day. The Society Meeting proved to be very successful according to reports from Red Martin, the General Chair on behalf of the Chapter. Fraser Wiggins was the Chapter President that year, and presided over a Chapter that had grown to 190 members. Scholarships were established for deserving students at BCIT and UBC and that tradition continues to this day. Some 576 members registered for the meeting.

1961	spring	The Third Annual Region 2 CRC held in Quebec , no minutes available DRC was D.L.Angus. 8 chapters assigned to region
1962	July 62-June 63	Second Canadian Society President John H.Fox from Toronto 1903-1990
1962	Mar 21 to 23, 1962	The Fourth Annual Region 2 CRC held at the Park Plaza Hotel in Toronto ; John Ross was DRC and the host chapter President was Ernie Fox. 8 chapters present. Chapter Delegates and Alternates from Edmonton [N Alberta Chapter], Calgary [S.Alberta Chapter], Winnipeg [Manitoba chapter], Ottawa Valley, Quebec City, Hamilton [Niagara Peninsula Chapter], Montreal and Toronto[Ontario] Chapter. John Everetts ASHRAE Society President attended meeting along with local member John Fox who was society's 1st VP. Mr Everett reminisced about working in Montreal in 1932 when he was involved in the design and installation of A/C for the Mt.royal Hotel and the Dawes Black Horse Brewery. A Saskatchewan chapter announced as being formed with the Niagara Peninsula Chapter [now Hamilton] donating an engraved gavel. Regional Director was John Fox and the host chapter President was Ernie Fox - Ontario
1963	May 2 to 3, 1963	The Fifth Annual Region 2 CRC hosted by S.Alberta Chapter with meeting held in Banff with 8 chapters present. Bal Horsburgh was the DRC. The Alternatives travel was paid by the chapter. The NY HQs was undersubscribed re rent [of \$4.50/sq ft] so a chapter campaign for contributions was initiated at the CRC.
1963	Fri March 22, 1963	Niagara Peninsula Chapter presented gavel to newly chartered Saskatchewan Chapter located in Regina Saskatchewan -the tenth Canadian Chapter chartered and the ninth Chapter in Region 2 . This region represented all of Canada except the BC Chapter.
1964	May 8 to 9, 1964	The Sixth Annual Region 2 CRC held in Ottawa , Bal Horsburgh was DRC. 9 chapters represented
1964	###	The Montreal Chapter held what they described as a "mock" chapter meeting in Halifax Dec 10, 1954 with more than 50 present to demonstrate the need to charter a chapter in the Maritimes. A few months later after Society council approval, the Maritime Chapter was formed. DRC Bal Horsburgh attended this meeting.
1965	Mar 15,1965	Atlantic Provinces Chapter was the 100 chartered in Society and became the 10th chapter of ASHRAE in Region 2 with Leslie Single as Chapter President; Name would be changed to Halifax Chapter in 1970. Montreal Chapter helped organize and sponsored the new chapter. Charter night held at Citadel Inn with chapter President Les Single. Gord Weld was President the next year
1965	May 5 to 7, 1965	The Seven Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Winnipeg at the International Inn with the Manitoba chapter as host. Bal Horsburgh was DRC. 10 chapters now in the region with Atlantic Canada -Halifax the newest chapter chartered. The business sessions were presided by Bal Horsburgh. National Officers were John Dube National president; John Fox the 1962 National President and immediate past DRC, Andrew Boggs, from HQs in New York was at head table along with don Ledgett chair of MP committee. Three chapters were awarded a membership citation - Saskatchewan, S.Alberta and Ontario [Toronto]. A dinner-dance was held at the Niakwa Golf and Country Club
1965	Fri March 25, 1966	Saskatoon chapter was chartered as Region 2's 11th ASHRAE chapter
1966	May 4 to 6, 1986	The Eighth Annual Region 2 CRC held in Hamilton Ontario, a first for the Chapter. 11 chapters represented
1966	June 27 to 29, 1966	The Seventh Society meeting outside the USA was held June 27 to 29th, 1966 in Toronto with the local chapter hosting the Society Annual Meeting on Canadian soil for the fourth time since 1929. The meeting was officially the 73th AGM - Annual General Meeting of the Society. James W. May was Society President. 659 members registered for the meeting.
1967	Mon May 01, 1967	The Ninth Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Montreal with Percy Butler from Edmonton Alberta DRC. 11 chapters
1968	spring	The Tenth Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Edmonton, hosted by N.Alberta Chapter with local member Percy Butler as DRC. 11 chapters
1969	July 1969-June 1970	The third Canadian Society President William G.Hole of Montreal-Presidential theme "Man and his World- that is what ASHRAE is all about" 1910-2002. He was installed as ASHRAE's 75th President July 1st, 1969 in Denver Colorado which was Canada's 75th anniversary as well on July 1st. He was originally from Edmonton and graduated from the University of Alberta. He was ASHAE DRC from 1958 to 1959 for Region 7 -Canada. Previously he was Montreal Chapter President
1969	spring	The Eleventh Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Halifax, Percy Butler DRC with 11 chapters represented. Conference Chair was Jim A. Maclean from the host chapter-Halifax
1970	spring	The Twelfth Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Winnipeg with Manitoba Chapter as host, Jake Klassen from Ottawa as DRC
1970	Wednesday, July 01, 1970	PAOE - Society President F.H. Bridges introduced the concept of the PAOE for ASHRAE committees and chapter to "strive for excellence". Every committee had to define their goals for the Seventies. Society had 110 chapters chartered.
1971	spring	The 13th Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Quebec, Jake Klassen as DRC. 11 chapters in region. Frank Bridges Society President and Andy Boggs were also present.
1971	Thu July 01, 1971	New Chapter Awards of Excellence - Society President Dr. Stanley F. Gilman set a new criteria for a Chapter Awards of Excellence - 4 categories: membership increase; attendance increase; research contributions; and CRC attendance.
1971	###	A group of ASHRAE members met at the Lions club centre in Moncton to discuss the formation of a chapter in Moncton. Kirk Bavis and John MacLean from Moncton attended the '71 CRC in Quebec as observers. The NB/PEI operated as a branch of Halifax chapter
1972	March 16 to 17, 1972	The 14th annual Region 2 CRC was held in Toronto with 12 chapters represented [Ottawa, Niagara, N.Alberta, London, Quebec, Halifax, Saskatoon, Regina, S.Alberta, Montreal, Ontario, Winnipeg]. 46 members and guests registered. Registration was \$55/couple and \$30/single. J.C.Olsen was conference Treasurer. G.E. Menzies as Hamilton Chapter President, presented a petition for a chapter in London ON. It was approved and was then approved by the Society BOD at their AGM in June.

1972	Fri March 17, 1972	ASHRAE Research Canada [ARC] was incorporated under the Canada Corporations Act March 17, 1972. Headquarters was established at Suite 3900, 1155 Dorchester Blvd West Montreal Quebec. The Executive Officers [Class A members] were Hayward G.S. Murray President, Jacob Klassen Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer John H. Fox. Hay Murray as the RVC Research Promotion realized in 1971 that Canadian contributions to ASHRAE research program were not tax deductible for businesses in Canada. He said he would fix the problem. So with his company lawyers, he put together a proposal for Revenue Canada and soon ARC was incorporated. The first Annual General Meeting [AGM] was held at head office March 20, 1072, three days after incorporation. The second AGM was held Oct 19, 1972, the third April 18th, 1973 at the spring CRC for Region 2 when all the Class "b" Members were present - Class b being the chapter Delegate to a CRC. The fourth AGM was held in Calgary in 1974 at the CRC. In 1975 Bev Neill became ARC's 2nd President.
1972	Mon May 08, 1972	Charter night in London for the London Canada Chapter. London was now the Twelfth chapter operating in the Region 2. Present for chapter night was Dave Rickleton Society President who presented the charter to Chapter President Jack Vanstone. Andy Boggs presented Society Headquarters
1972	Friday, October 13, 1972	New Brunswick PEI chapter was chartered October 13, 1972. It is located in Moncton NB and is the 13th chapter chartered in region. Chapter was sponsored by Atlantic Chapter which changed it's name to Halifax to accommodate the NB/PEI chapter. Charter night was at the Brunswick Hotel in Moncton with 80 members and guests present. Society Officers present were society President Walter f. Spiegel, Executive Director Andrew T. Boggs the Third, and Jacob Klassen DRC for Region 2. Gavel was presented by Jake Klassen region 2 DRC. James Scriven, President of the sponsoring chapter Halifax assisted in the evening's events. The slate of officers for the new chapter were K.Bavis President; Robert Macpherson VP; Secretary Ken Perry; Treasurer Brian Hildreth and Governors Glen Cowan; Joe Slein and John MacLean. There are now 13 chapters in Region 2
1973	May 16 to 18, 1973	The 15th Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Regina, J.Klassen DRC. 13 chapters represented [Ottawa, NB/PEI -to be chartered in Oct, Montreal, Hamilton, Ontario, Halifax, Quebec, London, Manitoba, Regina, S. Alberta, N.Alberta, Saskatoon]. 48 registrants were at meeting. Cost was \$30/delegate and \$25 for companions.
1973	Monday, October 01, 1973	Society President Rod Kirkwood used the term "Presidential Award of Excellence" and detailed the format for a par of 1200 points and a special award of 2400 points. By 1974 Society President David Rickleton had developed detailed formulas for the criteria to ensure all chapters had an equal change of winning the award.
1974	April 17 to 19, 1974	The 16th Annual Region 2 CRC was held in Ottawa. 13 chapters. Registration was \$70/couple
1975	April 16 to 18, 1974	The 17th Annual Region 2 CRC held in Calgary Alberta at the Calgary Convention Center hosted by the Southern Alberta Chapter of ASHRAE. 13 chapters present. DRC was F.D.Ledgett, Society Pres-Elect Bill Collins who delivered the presidential address. Conference Chair was Bill Herr. At the banquet, all delegates, alternates and spouses became honorary Calgarians receiving the traditional White Stetson hats.
1974	June 23 to 27, 1974	The Eighth Society Meeting held outside USA was held June 23 to 27, 1974 in Montreal, the third time the chapter had hosted a society meeting. This was officially the 81st Annual General Meeting of the Society. Rod R. Kirkwood was Society President. Some 1169 members registered which was almost double the number from the last Canadian AGM held in Toronto in 1966
1975	Tue July 01, 1975	The Ontario chapter won its first PAOE award when the chapter modified its MBO to parallel the program established by the Society President in the PAOE.
1976	April 21 to 23, 1976	The 18th annual Region 2 CRC held in Hamilton Ontario for first time at the Royal Connaught Hotel; Donald Ledgett was DRC; Region 2 had 13 chapters - Halifax; NB/PEI; Quebec; Montreal; Ottawa; Toronto; Hamilton; London; Manitoba; Regina; Saskatoon; S.Alberta; N.Alberta [13 in total]. Society introduced concept of a reorganization to try to equalize the number of chapters in a region. CRC assessment was 1.00 per member.
1977	June 26 to 30, 1977	The Ninth society meeting outside the USA was hosted by the Halifax Chapter at the Hotel Nova Scotian in Halifax June 26 to 30th ,1977 and was the largest summer meeting of ASHRAE at 1214 members registered. Region 2 DRC G.E.Menzies did the welcoming in the Planery Session. There was the biggest lobster party ever held at a Society Meeting. It was held on the waterfront at the Historic Properties where there were boatloads of beer. John Perkins was General Conference Chair, Paul Conrad was Chapter President. William P. Chapman was Society President, Bruno Morabito, Society Pres-Elect, Andrew Boggs Society Secretary. This meeting was officially the 84th AGM - Annual General Meeting of the Society
1977	April	The 19th Annual Region 2 CRC was hosted by the Manitoba chapter in Winnipeg. 13 chapters were present.

The biggest buzz at the ASHRAE Winter Conference was the announcement of ASHRAE's rebranding, which includes a new logo and tagline, as well as a move to refer to the Society as simply "ASHRAE," as opposed to its full name. A redesigned ASHRAE.org was also announced along with the rebranding during the Conference. "The evolved ASHRAE brand supports our focus on improving engineering standards and our market position as a community of engineers and related professionals united by knowledge, mission and a code of ethics to design, construct and operate better places for people to live, work and play," ASHRAE President Ron Jamagin, said.</p> <p>A redesigned ASHRAE.org was also announced along with the rebranding during the Conference. The updated website provides better navigation, a better search engine and better tracking, all of which helps visitors find the information they need to support their efforts in the industry and the Society.</p> <p>The Winter Conference technical program featured nearly 300 presentations, with the top attended session in the systems and equipment, O&M and high performance buildings tracks. The top-attended sessions were Selection of Proper Chiller Technology; Thermal Displacement Ventilation Applications; Heat Pump Optimization; Air Source vs. Ground Source Heat Pump Systems; Integrated Design Energy Retrofits; and Water-Cooled VRF Systems. Other Conference highlights included the Technical Plenary, which drew 600 attendees, with its focus on Chicago's Energy-Efficient, Economic Model for Sustainability. These, and additional sessions, from the Technical Program are part of ASHRAE's Virtual Conference, which provides access to more than 250 presentations and PDF's of posters.</p>
