



REGION II - 31ST ANNUAL CHAPTERS'

REGIONAL CONFERENCE

OCTOBER 5-8TH, 1988

FIRST BUSINESS SESSION

1. CALL TO ORDER

Norman Johnson, Regional Chairman called the meeting to order at 8:30 AM Thursday October 6, 1988 and welcomed all present. The meeting was held in Salon ABC, Wharton Hotel, London, Ontario Canada.

Chairman Johnson thanked John Kenney, Conference Chairman and the London Chapter for hosting this event.

Chairman Johnson introduced the head Table: J. Richard Wright, Staff, Atlanta Headquarters, Donald E. Nichols, Society Vice-President, Louis F. Flagg, Society President, George W. Buckler, Society Vice-President, Jules Olsen, Director-At-Large, Tom Drennan, CRC Secretary, John Kenney, CRC Host Chairman and Gail Menzies, Recording Secretary.

2. **ELECTION OF SECRETARY**

On Motion by Victor Belliveau of Halifax, seconded by Howard Wheatley of Toronto, Tom Drennan was unanimously elected as CRC Secretary.

It was noted that Gail Menzies, would be Recording Secretary.

3. WELCOME

Chairman Johnson invited John Kenney hosted Chairman to address the meeting.

John Kenney welcomed all members to London and the CRC. He made a few announcements regarding the Conference.

4. ROLL CALL

Chairman Johnson introduced his Regional Vice-Chairmen after which Chapter Delegates and Alternates made self introductions.

Refer to Appendix "A: for those in attendance. Chairman Johnson asked those present to sign the attendance sheets being circulated.

5. PAST REGIONAL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Johnson called upon George Buckler, Past Regional Chairman and Society Vice-President. Vice-President Buckler welcomed everyone to the CRC and gave a brief outline of the accomplishments in Region II over the years when he was Regional Chairman. This report is attached as Appendix "B".

6. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Chairman Johnson asked for a Motion to approve the Minutes of the 1987 CRC.

On motion by Gerry Waselynchuk of New Brunswick Chapter, seconded by Gary Romagnoli of Hamilton Chapter, the Minutes of May 13-15, 1987 CRC were accepted as printed. CARRIED.

7. REMARKS FROM SOCIETY OFFICERS AND STAFF

a) Louis F. Flagg, President

Chairman Johnson introduced the President of Society, Mr. Louis F. Flagg. Mr. Flagg reported that he was delighted to be in London and Region II and would formally address the Conference at the Presidential Luncheon on Friday.

b) Donald E. Nichols, Vice-President

Chairman Johnson called upon Don Nichols, Vice-President of Society. Mr. Nichols reported what Society is doing to help Chapters and individual members.

Mr. Nichols advised that the "Strategic Plan 1988" was approved at the June 1988 Annual Society Meeting. This plan entitled "Fulfilling the Mission" has nine goals covering: ASHRAE Awareness, External Factors, International, Meetings, Membership, Organization, Publications, Research and Technology Transfer.

In summary, ASHRAE has grown in numbers and importance and with the participation of all members, it will continue to grow and help its members.

c) J. Richard Wright, Director of Technology

Chairman Johnson then called upon J. Richard Wright, Director of Technology, ASHRAE Headquarters in Atlanta.

RESEARCH PROMOTION

Vice-Chairman Bill Chadwick reported contributions were four per cent down from the previous year. Ottawa and Toronto were the only Chapters to meet their goals. This year, the Region's objective is \$95,000.00 which is a substantial increase. Chapter Presidents should monitor the Research Promotion committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Vice-Chairman Gerard Doyle reported a decrease of 138 assigned members. On the other hand, New Brunswick and Toronto exceeded PAOE par points. Ottawa increased their membership and London maintained their membership number. Regionally, student members increased from 482 to 776.

Current membership as of September 8, 1988 is 2,733. Our 1989 goal is 5% net increase and 3% advancement.

President Flagg asked if there was any reason for the decrease of members. Ottawa Valley advised that their Chapter did a survey of resignations and found that the under thirty resigned because of dues increases and the over thirty resignations were because of job changes.

"R" IN ASHRAE (NOW CALLED REFRIGERATION COMMITTEE)

Phil Landray noted that this is his first year as Regional Vice-Chairman, Refrigeration. He has contacted all eleven Chapters and ten have appointed committee men. Phil's objective is to have representation and refrigeration sessions in all eleven chapters.

ENERGY AND TECHNICAL AFFAIRS

Azarias Servant, Vice-Chairman reported that the PAOE points totalled 3,900 for the Region, a new high, but well below many other Regions.

During the year, there were twelve seminars of three hours or more in Region II. Eight entries (long form) and five Energy entries (short form) were submitted. Judging was held in Montreal on October 4th.

At Saturday's Workshop, you are invited to view a video entitled 'The World of Energy and Alternate Fuels'.

Mr. Wright brought greetings from Atlanta. He advised that his goal is to find ways to provide better service to members. The publication of INSIGHTS, more conferences, and the use of computers are some of the recent changes.

A direct-mail campaign was held this past year for research fund-raising and was only moderately successful and it will be tried again. Mr. Wright advised ASHRAE is spending more dollars in Canada than are being collected from Canadians.

The "Hot Buttons" at present are the CFC issue and Indoor Air Quality. ASHRAE is co-sponsor of several meetings coming up such 'Indoor Air '90' in Toronto, July 29 to August 3, 1990 which should be a direct benefit to ASHRAE members.

8. REGIONAL CHAIRMAN'S THEME

Chairman Johnson advised that his theme for the next term is 'Co-operation' which ties in with the Presidential theme of 'Communication'. Information must flow both ways in order to have a successful Region. When you get a request, put it on 'PRIORITY' and follow through. More information will be in his Regional newsletters.

9. REGIONAL VICE CHAIRMEN REPORTS

EDUCATION AND PROGRAM

Darryl Boyce reported that only seven out of eleven chapters submitted reports in 1987/88. This is likely a result of the shift to a Fall CRC.

Five chapters achieve the PAOE par points and five chapters showed improvement over the past year.

Regionally, performance in Educational activities in 1987/88 was down from the two previous years. It has been noted that if three of the four chapters had reported their activities, we would have had our best year ever and would have exceed the 5000 point level.

It is critical that the Chapter committee chairmen report their activities to the Regional Vice-Chairman and not Headquarters.

The best three Chapters in the Region are as follows:

Toronto, Ottawa and London.

ASHRAE RESEARCH CANADA

Paul Conrad invited and expected all delegates and alternates to attend the Annual Meeting of ARC at 7:00 A.M. on Friday. This is the Annual Meeting of the Corporation and not to be confused with the Research Promotion Workshop which will be held Saturday.

10. CHAPTER ANNUAL REPORTS

Chairman Johnson asked that the Chapters distribute their reports. Each Chapter was asked to comment on their year's activities with a time limit of five minutes.

LONDON CANADA: Peter Golem reported their Education Committee established a new Student Chapter at the University of Western Ontario. Their dues at \$110.00 up to \$10.00 with no negative effect. These dues include meals. In the Program area, two small digressions were tried. One was to have a non-technical presentation on a regular meeting night and the second was to feature local talent. Both these meetings were well received.

Energy and Technical Affairs had a poor year. The chairman resigned at mid year. By that time, the Chapter was heavily committed to arrangements for the CRC, 1988.

MONTREAL: Laurier Nichols advised his Chapter had a successful year. Chapter dues were increased to \$95.00 per year with no ill effect. There are 320 Chapter members. Energy and Technical Affairs held an Air Quality Seminar with 170 participants registered. It was very successful. Their short-coming this year was a lack of participation at some of the technical meetings. Those subjects which relate to specific industrial processes only should be eliminated.

Communication with Headquarters and other Chapters is a problem because 85% of the membership is French speaking. Mr. Nichols asked that Mr. Johnson consider asking Atlanta for a grant to help translate the Operations Manual.

HAMILTON: Gary Romagnoli reported Hamilton had a successful year. Dues have increased to \$135.00 included eight prepaid meals. Five dollars is given back if members pay by the first meeting. This allows membership roster to be published early in the year and is working well. Hamilton does not have a firm speakers list for this year, but is working on it. They have had problems in communication, but are trying to rectify this. Several new chapter chairmen were not sure of their duties and this is improving. One of their most successful meetings involved a 'three speaker panel' to discuss indoor air quality and its affects environmentally in the work place followed by a panel discussion.

This year, the chapter plans to promote membership not only in the Niagara Peninsula but further southwest of Hamilton, hopefully having several satelite areas being visited by the Executive throughout the year.

<u>WINDSOR</u>: Chris Hales reported his chapter obtained a permanent meeting location and this helped meeting attendance. Letter writing and a telephone campaign helped improve the membership as well. A mini-seminar series was instituted to run concurrently with the cocktail hour and this proved successful for the younger members and students.

A central CRC Library has been established for the use of each subsequent year's CRC team. This will enable the delegate and alternate to the CRC to be informed of the previous year's CRC activities. The Chapter was unable to obtain an Energy and Technical Affairs chairman this year.

OTTAWA VALLEY: Bill McKinnon reported their Chapter highlight was hosting the Annual Meeting of ASHRAE in June of 1988. This proved to be very successful. Their dues held the line at \$90.00 full and \$35.00 optional. Their low point was two seminars planned for 100 with only thirty registered participants. A communication problem with other seminars was blamed.

Ottawa Valley Chapter sponsored and hosted a PDS seminar and it was financially successful and well attended.

Their problem is a decline in Chapter Membership and meeting attendance. Meeting attendance is totally related to the program. A \$50.00 prize draw if Membership cheque is mailed in by gold day has proven successful.

SAGUENAY LAC ST. JEAN: Denis Rivard reported there seems to be a let down after hosting last year's CRC. This is also a young chapter and the chapter wants to improve their operation in Society. The Directors are attempting to translate the Operations Manual. It was noted that Saguenay Lac St. Jean has 43 Society members, but 63 Chapter members. The Delegate was advised that all Chapter members must be Society members or be listed as guests.

MISSISSAUGA: Bernard Ratledge reported his chapter is suffering the growing pains of a new chapter which is sandwiched in between Hamilton and Toronto. The highlight of the year was Charter Night with the low being the ability to keep Chapter Memberships expanding. Student members live in Mississauga, but attend University in Toronto and miss most meetings. Mississauga is the fastest growing municipality in Canada and the Executive is working on obtaining more members. Dues are \$25.00 with \$16.00 per meal pay as you go. There are 26 paid up members.

NEW BRUNSWICK: Gerry Waselynchuk reported his Chapter dues are \$30.00 and are collected by Society. Once again a very successful trade show was held. The M.E.E.T. '88 Show has proven to be a great fund raiser for the Chapter. The Chapter has sponsored a number of seminars/workshops in conjunction with Federal Energy, Mines and Resources and this promotes ASHRAE and they hope to attract more members in this way.

The problem area is only 11 members combined with 10 delinquent members. They are looking forward to hosting the CRC in August 1989.

TORONTO: Howard Wheatley reported the 66th year of operation has been one of continued improvement and success. Dues are \$170.00 with meals, \$70.00 without and \$30.00 for Life Members and Past Presidents. Meeting attendance increased by 3% to an average of 122 members. This membership area is to be worked on this year.

Their newsletter has been redesigned and the Roster reduced to pocket size. Production and mailing costs were substantially reduced.

Over \$17,000.00 was raised for Research and Par on all categories was achieved producing a star for the banner.

HALIFAX: Victor Belliveau reported dues are \$130.00 and \$50.00 without meals. This is billed through Society, but with some complication this year due to errors in the exchange rate on the dollar.

The Research Promotion campaign progressed smoothly and it is expected that the goal will be nearly reached. The objective of the Halifax Chapter is to encourage younger members to become more involved in chapter operations, placing more emphasis on "R" in ASHRAE, maintaining a balance between sales presentations and technical presentations, and identifying a project to enter in the energy award competitions. Except for the last, the objectives were for the most part reached.

The Regional Award of Merit was presented to Paul Conrad and a Regional Energy Award was presented to Al Hendry

We have tried to develop a new chapter in Newfoundland, but have not been successful to date. We have 55 Chapters members, 204 assigned with 25% in Newfoundland.

LA VILLE de QUEBEC: Jean Luc Morin reported dues are \$125.00 with meals. La Ville de Quebec has enjoyed a successful year with 5 regular meetings, one industrial visit and a symposium and social activity. Membership has maintained the same level as last year but many delinquents did not renew their membership due to retirement or orientation change. The Education committee has 775 points so far.

We have many Chapter members who are not Society members and we are working to improve this.

This major improvement for the year has been an increase in Chapter members to 101 and good attendance at Chapter meetings. Attendance at conferences was high because of the quality of the subjects and by the excellence of the speakers.

Chairman Johnson thanked the Delegates and Alternates for the good reports and the excellent question and answer period.

Chairman Johnson commended Hamilton Chapter for their members seminar survey and recommended other Chapters use this survey.

SECOND BUSINESS SESSION:

At 1:15 PM in Salons A&B, Chairman Johnson opened the Second Business Session. He called upon Jules Olsen, Society Director-At-Large.

<u>DIRECTOR-AT-LARGE</u>:

11. Mr. Olsen pointed out some very important aspects of ASHRAE. He said that ASHRAE is a leader in both research and technical issues such as C.F.C.'s, Indoor Air Quality and published papers. ASHRAE spends funds to further our technical knowledge, sponsors round-tables and conferences. In each of these areas, ASHRAE members have a stake. Participating in ASHRAE increases your leadership skills. He urged Delegates to become leaders in ASHRAE in their own Chapter as well as Society. Mr. Olsen asked members to pledge their support and make a commitment.

12. REGIONAL PLANNING MEETING AUGUST, 1988

This special meeting was chaired by Norman Johnson and held in Toronto. All invited Regional Vice-Chairmen and other Regional officials attended. Each attendee outlined his goals and objectives for the coming year. It was urged to give support to your Regional representatives, and report regularly.

13. OLD BUSINESS: RESOLUTIONS FROM MAY 1987 REGION II CRC:

George Buckler, Immediate Past Regional Chairman commented to the status of the 19 motions listed in the May 1987 Minutes.

George Menzies, Member of the Society Charter & By-Laws Committee advised that as a centennial feature at the Annual Meeting in Orlando in 1994, copies of all the charters might be displayed - if the chapters can locate them. Do you know where your Chapter's charter is? It was recommended that each chapter investigate where their original or copy is and report back at next year's CRC.

17. FUTURE SOCIETY MEETINGS

Chairman Johnson advised the Winter ASHRAE Society Meeting is being held in Chicago, January 27 - February 2, 1989. The Summer Annual Society Meeting will be held in Vancouver, June 25-29 1989.

18. ADJOURNMENT

On motion made and duly seconded, it was agreed to adjourn this Second Business Session.

19. THIRD BUSINESS SESSION

Chairman Johnson opened this meeting at 8:30 AM on Friday October 7, 1988.

After discussion regarding the CRC expenses for 1989, Gerry Waselynchuk of New Brunswick Chapter made the following motion:

THAT \$4.50 per chapter member be approved as the Regional assessment for the 1989 CRC based on the local chapter membership on January 1, 1989 and that this payment be received by the CRC host Chapter sixty days prior to the 1989 meeting with a 10% penalty for non-payment after that date.

Chairman Johnson advised the New Brunswick Chapter to keep a careful watch on the expenses and to try to keep registration as low as possible. Mr. Waselynchuk informed those present that their CRC has a budget of \$20,000.00.

20. CLOSING COMMENTS

Chairman Johnson reminded the attendees of the Workshops on Saturday.

He also thanked the London host chapter for presenting a successful CRC

Mr. Buckler, Past-Regional Chairman, thanked the chapters for their support over the past three years and wished Chairman Johnson all the best in the years to come.
