FIRST BUSINESS SESSION

1. CALL TO ORDER

N. Johnson, Ashrae Director and Regional Chairman called the session to order at 10:15 a.m. Thursday, August 23, 1990 and welcomed all those present. The meeting was held in Salon Viger A&B, Le Chateau Champlain, Montreal, Quebec. *

Chairman Johnson thanked Norman Nathan, Host Chairman and the Montreal Chapter for hosting this Conference.

Chairman Johnson asked the Delegates, Alternates, Vice-Chairmen and guests to introduce themselves.

The Chairman then introduced the Head table: Steve Comstock, Director, Communications and Publications, Ashrae Staff, Atlanta; Billy Manning, Society Vice-President from Alabama; Don Rich, President/Elect, Syracuse, N.Y.; Norman Nathan, Host Chairman, CRC, Montreal; Daniel Robert, C.R.C. Secretary; Gail Menzies, Recording Secretary; Jules Olsen, Society Vice-President, Toronto. Mr. Johnson also introduced Gordon Weld, Chairman Honours & Awards, from Halifax and Tom Anderson, Research, Atlanta, staff.

2. Election of Secretary

On motion by Bryon Landry and Roy Chaffey, Daniel Robert was elected Secretary for the CRC. CARRIED.

WELCOME

Norman Nathan, Host Chairman for CRC '90 welcomed all those present to Montreal CRC. He explained the events over the next few days and wished everyone a pleasant stay in Montreal.

4. ROLL CALL

The attendance sheet was passed and all present were asked to sign in. Refer to Appendix A for those in attendance.

5. REMARKS FROM SOCIETY OFFICERS AND STAFF

a) President-Elect, Don Rich

Chairman Johnson introduced President-Elect Don Rich.
Mr. Rich thanked the Montreal chapter for hosting this
CRC and noted he and his wife Joan were pleased to be here.
The Presidential address will be given at luncheon tomorrow -the theme being 'Professional Development through Participation'.

b) Society Vice-President, Billy Manning

Chairman Johnson introduced Billy Manning, Vice-President of Society. Mr. Manning said that he was excited to be here in Montreal with the temperatures cooler than Birmingham, Alabama. He pointed out that only those who fully participate in ASHRAE reap the benefits of membership and that your participation has driven society forward. He also noted the Standards and Guidelines set by ASHRAE and other resources available to members, as well as the research projects, seminars, and symposiums sponsored by ASHRAE. Mr. Manning reported that the BOD is committed to using wisely the dues collected from members. Finally, he said ASHRAE is committed to improving the quality of life for many people and that our work affects everyone throughout the world.

c) Steven Comstock, Director of Communications & Publications

Mr. Comstock gave an outline of his work at Headquarters in Atlanta. He also advised the group of the procedure & time to get information into 'Insights'. Mr. Comstock told the meeting of the wealth of information available to them. Thirty-five new standards were published last year. There is also a video explaining how STD 90.1 is used and also a 35 minute tape and slide presentation. These are available on loan or for sale to all chapters. Mr. Comstock advised the meeting to take advantage of the information available to them. Samples of the publications will be on display throughout the CRC.

d) Society Vice-President, Jules Olsen

Mr. Olsen advised that ASHRAE exists for its members and because of its members. He explained in detail how the Board of Directors is set up.

e) Gordon Weld, Chairman, Society Honours & Awards Committee

Mr. Weld explained how the Honours and awards Committee functions. He explained in detail the three basic awards, personal to an individual, pass through awards and publication or paper awards. He also explained how important it is to submit complete information when nominating someone for an award.

f) Paul Conrad, President, ASHRAE Research Canada

Mr. Conrad advised the Annual ARC meeting is scheduled for Saturday, August 25, 1990, 7:00 a.m. and invited all those in attendance to attend.

He also advised that the 1994 Celebrations are still in the planning stages.

6. REGIONAL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Johnson noted that his theme for the year was the same - 'Communication and Co-operation'. There has been some improvement, but still along way to go.

Membership promotion was down 2.1% across the Region. La Ville de Quebec was up 6.1%, London up 5.1% and Saguenay Lac St. Jean up 2.9%. Region 2 had the second lowest PAOE points of the twelve regions.

Even with the downswing in our economy, we realized two very successful years in research promotion. Mr. Johnson noted with new enthusiastic officers in the chapters for next year, he is certain Region 2 will become strong and viable.

He also noted that Mississauga Chapter has regrouped and is well on its way to becoming a strong Chapter.

7. VICE-CHAIRMEN'S REPORTS

HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

Vice-Chairman Cliff Thompson advised it had not been an overly active year. A packet had been sent to all Chapter Historians and will be discussed at the Workshop.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Vice-Chairman John Dugan gave a report from Retiring V.C. Gerard Doyle. Seven chapters exceeded Membership Promotion PAOE par. La Ville de Quebec was the highest with 751 points and Toronto Chapter second with 663. Communication is again a problem with only eight of eleven chapters reporting. Only 5 chapters responded to PAOE Bonus Point Questionnaiares and the others missed receiving their bonus points. 'Communicate'.

Don Rich, Society P/E commented that he was disappointed with the number of advancements. It is very important to see that the members get their advancements as it could effect their qualifying for awards in the future.

EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

Vice Chairman John Bisset noted the name change of the committee. Chapter Programs has moved to E.T.A.

Mr. Bisset has just completed his first year. The committee is developing comprehensive programs for secondary and college courses. They are recommending that teachers in math and science at the secondary level and math, science and engineering at the college level be invited to technical programs.

Communication is a problem and work will be done in this area. Visits to Halifax, Moncton and Toronto are planned this year. 'COMMUNICATE'.

REFRIGERATION COMMITTEE

Vice-Chairman Phil Landray visited four chapters this past year. All ll Chapters have a Refrigeration Chairman and the majority have refrigeration subjects and speakers at some of their meetings.

The ICEMAN award plaque was developed. This award recognizes the Chairman and Chapter who contributed the greatest number of PAOE points during the year. Don McKeen of Ottawa Valley won with 415 points. Chapter reporting is still a problem. 'COMMUNICATE'.

ENERGY AND TECHNICAL AFFAIRS (ETA)

Simon Jol is completing his first term. This is a grass roots committee doing a fantastic job providing technology transfer. In order to improve communications a newsletter will be produced monthly. Mr. Jol reported on the activities of this committee and awards will be named later in the meeting. 'COMMUNICATE'.

The meeting adjourned for lunch at 12 noon.

FIRST BUSINESS SESSION (continued)

Chairman Johnson called the meeting to order at 1:25 p.m. on Thursday, August 23, 1991. The meeting was held in Salon Viger A&B, Le Chateau Champlain, Montreal, Quebec.

Chairman Johnson asked that the Chapters distribute their reports and each Chapter was given five minutes to comment on their activities for the year.

8: CHAPTER REPORTS

LONDON

Greg James reported that London Chapter had a very active and productive year.

The principal theme was focused on Chapter Membership. The London Chapter has seen good growth in meeting attendance and good growth in membership. Six chapter members upgraded their membership level, three chapter members were guest speakers at chapter meetings and six chapter members have attended this year's CRC. Mr. James reported that their CRC fund is being used to increase the number of Chapter members in attendance at CRCs.

WINDSOR

Greg Dufour reported that Windsor has had good meeting attendance. Good speakers and mini seminars before the meetings were designed to help student members and the younger members by drawing on the experience of the more experienced members. This has worked very well.

The Windsor chapter has great involvement in the community. The Research Promotion fell short, but the Chapter felt the goal was a little unrealistic. All in all, the Chapter had a good year.

HAMILTON

Ray Bates advised of the new enthusiastic executive at the Hamilton Chapter for 1990-91.

Hamilton Chapter has just completed its 31st year and membership grew slightly. Plans and key objectives for the new year include increased membership, programme speakers and financial chapter improvements. The research programme was well handled with a modest but important increase over the previous year. Social events, especially the golf day are well attended.

It was noted that Niagara College has discontinued the EVAC course, hence the significant drop in student members.

Hamilton is looking forward to a very successful year.

TORONTO

Roy Chaffey reported that 1989/90 was full of challenges. After many years of deficit budgeting, a non-deficit budget with the goal for all activities to be self-supporting to the financial well-being of the chapter was set and proved successful.

Student night was a great success with 25 members in attendance from four colleges and the University of Toronto.

Membership growth was not as high as expected but we are working on this for 1990.

Toronto has an advisory committee made up of Past-presidents One member attends each Board Meeting and if the Board runs into a problem, advice is sought from the Past-Presidents.

OTTAWA VALLEY

Bryon Landry reported Ottawa had experienced another successful year. The key objectives for the year were a shift in focus from the recruitment of new society to new chapter members; to promote faculty liaisons and student membership; to use the newsletter more effectively to communicate to the chapter members; and a goal of 185 chapter members.

The chapter's financial situation was the most difficult problem faced but by year end a surplus bank balance surfaced. The meal plan dues were increased from \$90.00 to \$125.00. Chapter membership increased 14% to 181 members. Volunteering, specifically the shortage of it, is the most difficult problem we face as a chapter.

MONTREAL

Tony DiFruscio reported on a successful year.

Their meeting location was changed with no major problem. Research Promotion campaign was a success. Contributions reached \$8,000.00 representing a 300% increase from last year.

Montreal Chapter has now set up a permanent office and hired close to a full-time executive secretary to operate this area.

Montreal Chapter had a busy year with hosting the 1990 CRC but also a very successful year in chapter operations as well.

SAGUENAY LAC ST. JEAN

France Renaud reported a successful year mostly with chapter program and meeting attendance. The finances are limited and they plan to work hard to improve this area.

The chapter had a growth of six new members.

La VILLE de QUEBEC

Yves Trudel reported their Chapter had a most successful year.

The most successful events were: a technical seminar Indoor Air Quality, a refrigeration program, CFCs and their substitutes - Refrigerant reclaim systems. Membership promotion, Chapter Program and meeting attendance as well as research fund raising were also successful.

Advertising the ASHRAE Chapter meetings in the local newspaper has proved successful. The cost is \$300.00 per year.

HALIFAX

Doug Rafuse reported Halifax Chapter had a reasonably successful year.

Their objectives were to increase the attendance at the monthly meetings and increase the membership and also continue efforts to persuade the HVAC course students at the Technical University of N.S. to become student members. Both objectives were achieved. Invoicing of the Chapter Dues through ASHRAE headquarters has resulted in a substantial increase in paid Chapter membership. In the Research Promotion area, the Chapter exceeded its goal by more than 50%.

The good technical programmes proved successful, but difficulties in obtaining good speakers on topics of interest to members continues.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Brien Storey reported on a challenging and productive year. Their two main objectives were the advancement of six associate members to full member status and establishing an advisory committee to assist the Executive when requested in the resolution of difficult issues. As of June 1990, four of six applications for Member status have been approved and the two remaining are in the works. A CRC advisory committee was established.

With the dismantling of the local office of Energy Mines and REsources Canada, ASHRAE has lost an invaluable resource for seminars and speakers. This year's Meet '90 was a tremendous success and has enabled us to establish a Scholarship which will provide post-graduate funding to mechanical engineering students at four New Brunswick educational institutions.

MISSISSAUGA

Lou Doody reported that Mississauga Chapter enjoyed a successful year. The main activity has been the monthly meeting. At the beginning of the year, there was uncertainty regarding the future of the Chapter, but after a strong appeal, volunteers to assist with Chapter operations came forward.

The average attendance for the year is 26 people. A record number of address changes was again recorded indicating the itinerant nature of our membership.

A full complement of Chapter officers has been elected for the coming year and we are looking forward to a successful year with continued growth.

Chairman Johnson thanked the attendees at the meeting for coming to the Montreal meeting and participating in the Conference.

President-Elect Don Rich thanked the Montreal Chapter for hosting this excellent CRC.


