Smudging ceremony is a culture aspect to many Indigenous communities where combustion of tobacco and herbal products occur as part of the cultural ceremony to bless the space. Currently, there are no guidelines from ASHRAE on environmental tobacco smoke (ETS), other than a position paper in which ASHRAE states that all smoking activity inside and near buildings should be eliminated.

ASHARE in working with the Indigenous communities should understand this ceremony to provide guidelines on how these spaces can be designed, but also understand the cultural importance of the smoke lingering purposely.

It is of absolute importance that the communities this is a part of are consulted and ASHRAE gives the upmost respect to understanding the ceremony and how smoke has to linger/stay; without side tracking the guideline/standard by assuming smoking activity should be eliminated.

Given ASHRAE's push for DEI, and given that design engineers are being asked by our clients to help support activities with an ETS component that has important cultural significance, we ask that ASHRAE take the lead in providing a guideline, as different government bodies in Canada are attempting to do this; and ASHRAE should be a leader. We recommend ASHRAE use its Canadian volunteers with connections to these communities and have been working with smudging rooms to help develop this standard; and to absolutely include consultation with indigenous communities at its core for developing this guideline/standard.

Status: 8/27/2023 Defeated Finance Committee

Finance Committee discussed and agrees with the notes provided by staff that at this time, setting up a website to process transactions in Canadian Dollar is not possible. Staff Notes: At this time, setting up a website to process transactions in Canadian Dollar is not possible because ASHRAE is an US based organization, have 100% of its employees in the U.S., and operate its business in USD, it is only able accept EFTs and Credit card payments in USD. ASHRAE does allow Canadian members to donate in Canadian dollars to ASHRAE Research Canada, but only if they send in the funds by check. As a reminder, when a Canadian, or any other member in the entire world, wants to donate, they should put a note in the note field where the want the funds to go. For example, the gift product code that the Canadian Chapter or an individual selects, for example RP24ACGN, credits the donation to ASHRAE Research Canada. When a donation is notated for ASHRAE Research Canada, ASHRAE would then take those funds and credit them to the ASHRAE Research Canada fund. When donating by credit card, it is recommended to use a credit card that has no international transaction fees with no annual fee.

The motion asks for the 10 Year History Report to be updated to allow Chapter volunteers to see gifts from everyone who gave to that campaign, even if it's a donor outside of their home chapter. Currently, gift records are assigned to chapters in our database. After modifying existing reports and building new ones, staff determined that it is not possible to modify the report in this way. Instead, we offer a different solution: Chapter volunteers can now pull up to 10 years of their donor detail reports, which show all donors to a campaign regardless of chapter affiliation. They can access this information through the reports available at ASHRAERP.com

Native IAT

Native American ('Native - White American' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to recognize last names that are more likely to belong to Native Americans versus White Americans.

Religion IAT

Religion ('Religions' IAT). This IAT requires some familiarity with religious terms from various world religions.

Presidents IAT

Presidents ('Presidential Popularity' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to recognize photos of Joseph Biden and one or more previous presidents.

Disability IAT

Disability ('Physically Disabled – Physically Abled' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to recognize figures representing physically disabled and physically abled people.

Gender-Career IAT

Gender - Career. This IAT often reveals a relative link between family and females and between career and males.

Race IAT

Race ('Black - White' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to distinguish faces of European and African origin. It indicates that most Americans have an automatic preference for white over black.

Skin-tone IAT

Skin-tone ('Light Skin - Dark Skin' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to recognize light and dark-skinned faces. It often reveals an automatic preference for light-skin relative to dark-skin.

Sexuality IAT

Sexuality ('Gay - Straight' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to distinguish words and symbols representing gay and straight people. It often reveals an automatic preference for straight relative to gay people.

Executive Summary

President David Underwood established the *Women in ASHRAE* (WiA) ad hoc committee to explore the opportunities for a women's affinity group within ASHRAE. The committee was tasked with

- Developing a mission for the affinity group and determining how best to support this
 endeavor at Society while also exploring opportunities to work with partner
 organizations such as AIA, IAQA, USGBC, etc.
- Exploring ways to attract more women to ASHRAE and encouraging women who are current members to seek leadership roles at chapter, region and Society
- Investigating ways to reduce barriers that may be preventing women from becoming active in ASHRAE

Although the ad hoc was charged with focusing on women's issues related to ASHRAE involvement, the committee wants to emphasize that issues that affect women also affect other groups, including minorities and younger professionals. ASHRAE can be at the forefront of a paradigm shift in the building industry if it helps the industry adapt to changes in worker needs and expectations.



The subcommittee will proactively pursue and celebrate diverse and inclusive communities, understanding that doing so fuels better, more creative, and more thoughtful ideas, solutions and strategies for the Society and the communities our Society serves.

Members Council: Regional DEI Chair

Approved by Members Council (June 2023)

Motion from Region XII: **That the position of Region Diversity Chair be added to the Region CIQ (i.e., the Region Information Questionnaire) and that this position be added to the list of potential allocated visit utilizations in Section B of Appendix D of the Region Operations Manual, effective July 1, 2023.**

Background: On October 31, 2022, a request was sent by Joyce Abrams on behalf of the Board of Directors Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Subcommittee (BOD DEI Subcommittee) for a request of two DEI Ambassadors for each region, with the following duties identified.

- The ambassadors will be expected to promote the presentations in their Region, track the use of the presentations, and provide feedback to the DEI Subcommittee and the DEI consultant.
- The BOD DEI Subcommittee will provide a schedule for the presentations after the ambassadors are identified.

In response to the DEI Ambassadors' charge to promote DEI training presentations to Chapters, track presentation use, and provide feedback to the DEI Subcommittee, as well as to foster Chapter Diversity-based activities, Region XII created the Region Diversity Chair position. This position is expected to also lead the Diversity Workshop for CRC training. Adding the Region Diversity Chair to the Region CIQ will permit the individual to receive a transportation allocation to CRC for conducting the CRC Workshop. This is a measure every Region can utilize, in light of the October 31, 2022, request by the BOD DEI Subcommittee of every region to identify DEI Ambassadors Fiscal Impact: Staff time to update the Region CIQ.

Members Council: Regional DEI Chair

Proposed Roles and Responsibilities (submitted to Members Council Operations Subcommittee; to be approved by Members Council – Fall 2023)

Regional Diversity Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Chair: A regionally appointed position to promote DEI initiatives within the region and foster Society's commitment to a diverse and inclusive membership. This person should have previous experience serving on a DEI, Diversity in ASHRAE (DIA) or Women in ASHRAE (WIA) committee at the chapter, regional or society level and have knowledge of DEI issues, especially as they relate to their local region.

Since our Society's inception you, our volunteer Members, and our Chapters have laid the foundation to invest in and ensure ASHRAE's relevance to important events of the times.

Our 2024-2025 Society theme, "Empowering Our Workforce: Building A Sustainable Future" focuses on attracting, retaining and maintaining the HVAC&R workforce of the future, today. Our industry is growing and the number of HVAC systems in operation will triple in the next 30 years to over 6 billion, yet our workforce is shrinking. We will build 2.5 trillion square feet of new buildings and renovate another 2.5 trillion square feet of existing buildings by 2050 to accommodate a global population of nearly 10 billion people. To meet the challenges we've accepted, create a sustainable world for everyone and decarbonize the built environment we will need to nearly triple the number of people working in our industry in the coming decades. 

SECTION 8 MANAGEMENT BY OBJECTIVES

8.1 Introduction

Having a plan for the Society year is an important step in helping the chapter operate effectively and efficiently.

Society leadership encourages short-term planning based on Management by Objectives (MBO).

Although the MBO process helps with short-term planning, objectives should be developed to meet Society's long-term goals.

8.2 Management by Objectives – A Management Planning Tool

MBO is an effective tool in attaining and measuring results. The main characteristics of MBO are:

A. Written

The MBO process requires a written plan. Once written, the document can be referred to later for comparison. The plan should be available for the parties to the goal, as well as interested or related outside observers.

B. Understandable

Each MBO should be described in simple language that is not subject to multiple interpretations. It must be clear, concise and precise.

C. Measurable

Each MBO must be stated in terms that are measurable, such as dollars, units or other countable benchmarks. A complex objective can be broken down into a series of tasks that, upon their completion, become accountable benchmarks.

D. Attainable

Creating goals to impress others has absolutely no meaning as an objective. Each objective must be believable and realistic – with effort.

E. Challenging

While an objective must be attainable, it also must be challenging. If the task is too easy, the joy of accomplishment is lost and less output is attained to benefit the organization.

F. Agreed-Upon

Objectives must have the commitment of both the planner and the doer. Both parties must take ownership of the objective and agree that it is worthy, realistic and challenging.

G. Costed

For an objective to be truly evaluated and prioritized, it must have a price tag, in actual money cost, time expended, or opportunity cost. The costing of objectives allows the MBO to evolve into fiscal planning, as well as functional planning.

H. Timed

Objectives must have a point of conclusion. Often, the timeliness of accomplishment is crucial to the value of the effort.

Guidance for drafting well-constructed objectives is provided in **Appendix 8A**.

8.3 Planning Guide

The MBO planning guide provided in Appendix 8A is suggested for use by chapters to allow for a simple written plan, spelling out specific objectives and establishing priorities, related tasks or methodology for measurement. It also provides columns for due dates and interim progress reports.

Management by Objectives

MBOs should include **OBJECTIVES** and **ACTIVITIES** and be:

- Written
- Understandable
- Measurable
- Attainable
- Challenging
- Agreed-Upon
- Costed
- Timed

Planning your committee

Don't try to do things yourself! Form a committee to share the workload. Things to consider:

- Coordinate with the Membership Promotion Committee, YEA and Student Activities
- Strive for diversity within your committee

 - Race
 - Etc.





ABOUT WOMEN IN ASHRAE (WIA)

The Women in ASHRAE group was formed in 2015 as a joint effort between the National Capital Chapter and Baltimore Chapters of Region III in an effort to provide leadership opportunities for women within ASHRAE and a platform for networking to support the retention of women in the HWACRR industry. The group has been open to engineers, manufacturers representatives, sales representatives, architects, and people of all backgrounds who support the initiative.

The National Capital Chapter saw an increase in membership during 2016 of 43 members, 22 (51%) of those new members being women. Recognizing this success, the National Capital Chapter presented a motion at the annual CRC meeting in August 2016 asking ASHRAE to develop and maintain WiA as a formal committee, rather than an affinity group. This motion passed at the regional level and moved forward to Society where it became a diversity initiative for ASHRAE Society.



This message was illustrated at the January 2019 chapter meeting by ASHRAE Distinguished Lecturer Julia Reen, Professor of Architectural Engineering and Construction Science at Kansas State University. Years of special research and study indicated several reasons why women leave the industry and what can be done to help increase retention. This highly attended, eye-opening presentation launched the chapter's Women in ASHRAE.





CRC Motion Details

That a Chapter Administrator Roster be created for all chapters in the society to facilitate partnerships between chapters from different regions. Amended Motion: Region Operations Subcommittee (April 29, 2023): That a Chapter Administrator Rroster be created to include the email aliases for Chapter Presidents and CTTC Chairs for all chapters in the society to facilitate partnerships between chapters from different regions.

Background Info:

From 2022-2023 PAOE Newsletter: CO7 For each joint meeting with the chapter's partner chapter from a different region CO37 For developing a chapter to chapter partnership with a chapter from a different region (Chapter to submit partnership reports to DRC.) ASHRAE Society has encouraged us to create partnerships with other chapters from different regions. While this is an excellent initiative, we have found it difficult to identify and connect with potential partners in other regions due to a lack of accessible contact information. The proposed Chapter Administrator Roster would function similarly to the existing regional leader roster on the ASHRAE CIQ website. This roster would provide Chapter Administrators with access to the contact information of other chapter administrators only, thus avoiding any potential privacy issues that may arise from sharing the contact information of all society members and/or committee chairs. By creating this roster, we can help facilitate the formation of partnerships between chapters from different regions. This will not only enhance collaboration and knowledge-sharing across the society, but also strengthen the overall ASHRAE community.

Enabling access for members with "chapter administrator" status to view others with the same position in the CIQ website is estimated to require approximately 2 man-hours of work. The actual cost may vary depending on the hourly rate of the individuals involved in implementing this change.
